SYMPATHY FOR FINLAND RUSSIANS DENOUNCED DESTROYERS REPAIRED WALLACE AND HULL SPEAK LOOKING TO CONGRESS PRESIDENTIAL CAMPAIGNS THE ANTI-TRUST LAWS JAPAN AND THE U.S.

Russia's attack upon Finland produced much sympathy for the smaller Baltic power in this country. The President moved immediately to extend available assistance to Finns, evidently planning to Congress in January to return the December installment on the old war debt. Former President Hoover called for the prompt recall of the American Ambassador from Moscow and other speakers took turns denouncing the Russians and expressing their friendship for Finland.

The breaking off of diplomatic relations, it is said, was considered by the Administration but not effected for the simple reason that information is difficult to obtain from Russia and it was considered best to keep an American representative in Moscow. It was thought that, in some future emergency, he might be able to render some service for peace.

Considerable discussion followed revelations that a number of destroyers were in need of alterations. 


