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BENEFITS FOR THE CONSUMERS?

Does anybody want to know the sister, Mrs. George Beaman. justification for the payment of cash benefits to the farmers of the United States?

If high tariffs and other price-sup- day afternoon. porting devices for industrial products have (1) adversely affected the foreign market for farm products or (2) increased living and production costs of farmers in this country, then the farmer is entitled to similar "protection" from the government.

There seems to be no doubt but that certain policies of the Federal government, adopted to "protect" industry and labor, have impaired the foreign markets for our export crops. The figures also reveal that the prices of farm products in relation to nonfarm prices are about 225 per cent Miss Margaret Condon has been callbelow a normal relationship.

Consequently, in our opinion, there is the most complete justification for compensating "protection" for farmers in the form of cash benefits, often referred to as the "farmers' tariff." Now, let us proceed another step.

If cash benefits to farmers are justified by the fact that Federal policies have aided industry and increased the costs of what the farmers have to buy then the fact emerges that both policies increas the costs of living to all consumers.

This is what has happened in the nation during the past quarter of a century. Prices for the products of the farm have not attained pre-war figures but prices of non-agricultural products are above them.

The surpluses that have plagued the farmers of the nation are being slowly disposed of under present methods of crop control. Agriculture in the United States is on a limited production basis but prices continue below pre-war figures. Agriculture will only attain its pre-war status when there is available a market, at fair prices, for the production of the nation's farms without crop control.

The reader will note that we said "will only attain its pre-war status' in the above paragraph. It is still questionable whether the pre-war status of agriculture is sufficient, either from the standpoint of the farmers or the welfare of the nation,

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
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
