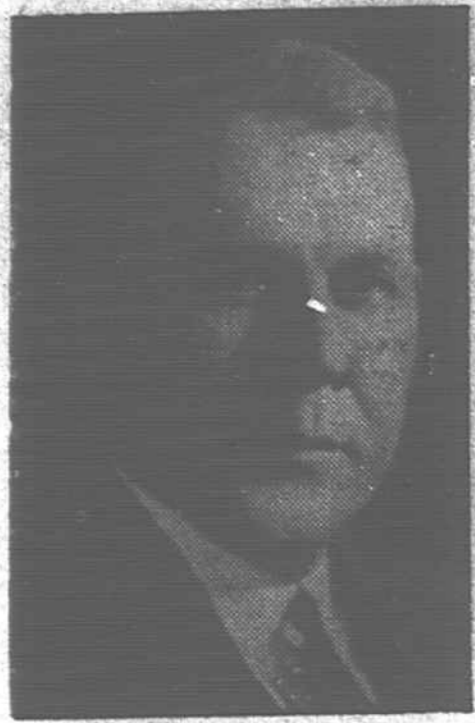

Approximately 5,000 farmers and farm women are expected to gather in Raleigh on Wednesday, June 5, for the annual meeting of members of the North Carolina Cotton Growers Cooperative Association and patrons of the Farmers Cooperative Exchange. Congressman Graham A. Barden of the third North Carolina district will be the principal speaker and M. G. Mann, general manager of the two cooperatives, will report on the past year's operations of the Cotton Association and the FCX.

JUNE DESIGNATED AS DAIRY MONTH IN STATE

Governor Hoey said: "North Carolina's greatest farm industry is closely allied with the dairy cow and her products, the annual income from which in this State approaches \$32,000,000. This will indicate the importance of this industry and also the possibilities in its further development. "Scientists have long recognized the high nutritional value of milk and its products; butter, cheese and ice cream; and from youth to old age they occupy primary position in the diet as nourishing, refreshing and appetizing drinks and dishes. A nation's human health is greatly enhanced by the products of the dairy cow, the foster mother of mankind. "Today milk and other products are relatively cheap; and June being the season of abundance on the market, prices always tend downward. Therefore, during the month of June milk will be among the most economical food purchases for any family. "With the idea of stimulating the use of dairy products during this period, it has been determined that June shall be designated as the DAIRY MONTH in North Carolina, during which time special attention should be given to dairy products and all of the people further urged to enjoy some of these delicious and wholesome products during these first summer months. And I admonish the people of North Carolina to drink more milk, use more butter, cheese and ice cream, and therefore increase the health and at the same time add to the stability

of this industry in a period of peak production; and I trust that the month of June will find all of our people participating in this observance."

AID TO HELPLESS VICTIMS

The American Red Cross is appealing to the people of the United States to contribute \$10,000,000 to a war relief fund. Officials of the organization say that it is impossible to exaggerate the rescue problem, pointing out that "probably 5,000,000 French and Belgians already are on the march, homeless, without food, many wounded and sick." The sympathy of the people of the United States is undoubtedly overwhelmingly on the side of the Allied nations. Once more, in the midst of warfare, the civilian population of these nations is suffering unimaginable hardships. If our sympathy means anything, we should respond to this appeal of the Red Cross and make available the \$10,000,000 requested and, if necessary, other millions later on to assist in the care of the refugees, many of whom are helpless children.

Windham, of Walstonburg; four grandchildren; three sisters, Mrs. Mary E. Case, of Farmville, Mrs. John Nanny, of Fountain, Mrs. R. F. Windham, of Raleigh, and brother, J. T. Bundy, of Farmville. LOCAL COLORED YOUTH ORDAINED BY BISHOP

New Bern, May 28.—Charles Merchant Johnson of New Bern, and Vernon Earl Artis of Farmville, Negroes, were ordained to the Episcopal diaconate at St. Cyprian's Episcopal Church at New Bern by the Rt. Rev. Thomas C. Darst, Wilmington, diocesan bishop. The two candidates who were recently graduated with honor from Bishop Payne Divinity School, Petersburg, Va., were presented by the Rev. R. I. Johnson, St. Cyprian's rector, father of one of the two. The ordination sermon was preached by the Rev. Worth Wicker, of Greenville. Seven other Episcopal clergymen of this section participated in the service, first of the kind ever held here. Johnson will be placed in charge of the mission churches of Washington, Belhaven, Aurora and Sladesville; and Artis will have charge of St. Timothy's, Farmville, and St. Andrew's, Greenville, during the summer months.
