The American Red Cross is appealing to the people of the United States to contribute \$10,000,000 to a war relief fund. The sympathy of the people of the United States is undoubtedly overwhelmingly on the side of the Allied nations. Once more, in the midst of warfare, the civilian population of these nations is suffering unimaginable hardships. If our sympathy means anything, we should respond to this appeal of the Red Cross and make available the \$10,000,000 requested and, if necessary, other millions later on to assist in the care of the refugees, many of whom are helpless children.
