Moore, 86, one of the first surgeons in Eastern Carolina, and the guid hand in building one of Eastern Carolina's first hospitals here, died Wedesday afternoon from pneumonis He had been ill for several weeks. Final rites were held Thursday afternoon and interment was made in Manlewood cemetery.

Born in Nash county, in 1855, Dr. Moore came to this section as a young man and became one of the first surgeons in this part of the state. He later was one of the guiding figures in the building and establishment of the Wilson Sanatorium. Still later he was one of the leading figures in building the Moore-Herring hospital, now the Woodard-Herring

He was Junior Warden and a vestryman in the Episcopal church for a number of years.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Fanny Joyner Moore, a son, Dr. K. C. Moore, of Newton Grove; and three daughters, Mrs. C. B. Valen-Joyner, of Wilson; and Mrs. Henry
