Charles Fitzgerald found in his study of birds in general that they were once very plentiful but that millions had been destroyed by willful waste in target shooting. Charles stated that birds were given to man to be cheerful companions and as a protection of plant life from insects, and that it is man's duty to preserve them by studying and meeting their needs, for which he will be repaid a hundredfold.

SEWING ROOM SCRAPS

The biggest scrap of news coming from the Red Cross Sewing Room this week is the one regarding the finished garments sent in the last shipment from this unit, which totaled three hundred and seventy-four. Included in this shipment were; 112 skirts, 35 shirts, 25 girls' dresses, 7 convalescent robes, 22 hospital shirts, 6 pairs men's pajamas, 82 army and navy sweaters, 11 children's sweaters, layettes of 30 gowns, 30 kimonos, 11 slips and 83 bands. Workers have expressed their appreciation to Mr. Elmsley for his service in pressing the sweaters sent from the sewing room. Mrs. W. M. Willis, production chairman, stated today that a large shipment of materials has been received for making sweaters, shirts, pajamas and convalescent robes for our own soldier boys. There is an urgent need for more workers, and if you can only sew on buttons, pack boxes or run errands, you can serve in the Red Cross Sewing Room. The Contract Club members met as a group in the Sewing Room Tuesday afternoon and were welcomed by the other workers, who found them to be able assistants.
