

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING \$6,000 FIRE FIGHTING EQUIP-MENT BONDS OF THE TOWN OF FARMVILLE, N. C.

BE IT ORDERED by the Board of Commissioners of the Town of need for burlap. Farmville, North Carolina:

Section 1. That pursuant to the Municipal Finance Act, 1921, bonds Carolina, are hereby authorized to be issued for the maximum aggregate amount of \$6,000 for the pur- to those helpers they can get. pose of acquiring fire fighting equip ment for said Town, the same being a necessary expense within the meaning of the Constitution of North Carolina.

Section 2. That a tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest of the bonds herein authorized shall be annually levied and collected."

Section 3. That statement of the debt of the Town has been filed with Clerk and is open to public inspection. Section 4. That this ordinance shall take effect thirty days after its first publication unless in the meantime a petition for its submission to the voters is filed under the Municipal Finance Act, 1921, and that in such event it shall take effect when approved by the voters of the Town at an election as provided in said Act.
