So many times the Israelites turned from God and each time their enemies overcame them; but when they went to the Almighty God they received His help.

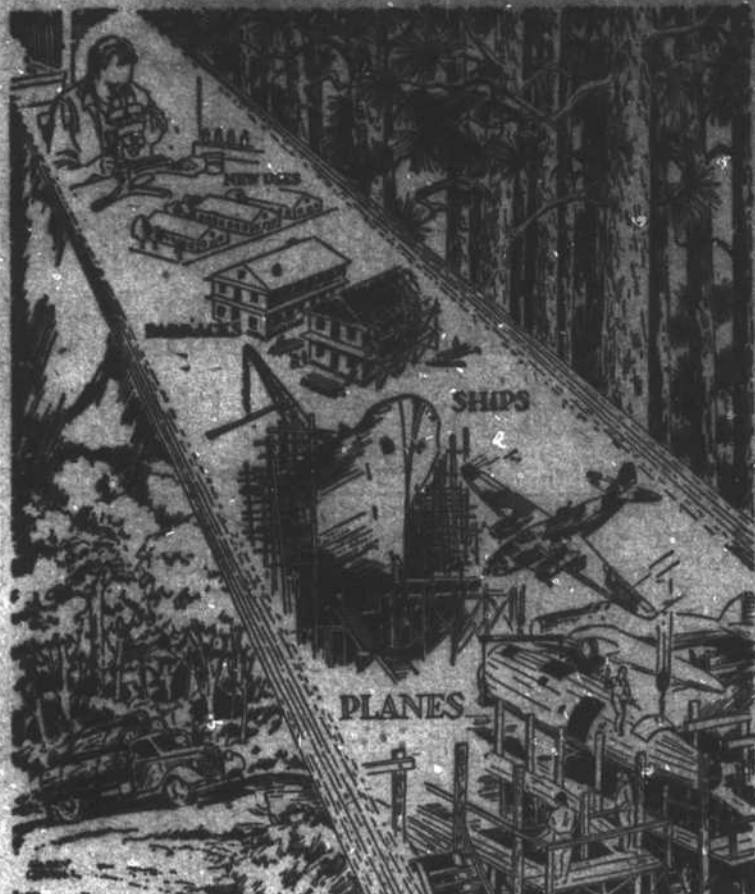
If MacArthur and his men would bow down in the dust and blood of the battlefield and earnestly ask God for help, they would get it, too.
