In general, are agronomist pointed out, surghum does well on any well-drained soil that is suitable for corn. Sandy loams and clay loams corn. Sandy loams and clay loams of medium to high fertility give the highest yields. Dark, heavy soils produce darker syrup than light colored sandy soils. Sorghum has shallow roots which


