FAMOUS YOUTH CHOIR TO GIVE VICTORY CONCERT HERE



The North Carolina Symphonic Choir, now known as the American Victory Choir of North Carolina, which will be heard here in a Victory concert, Tuesday, June 2, at 8:30 P. M., in the Farmville High School Auditorium. It is one of the country's unique musical organizations, being composed of thirty-six young people, under thirty years of age, from fifteen cities and towns in North Carolina. The choir was organized under the direction of Lewis Sidney Bullock, in 1940 and since that time has served its State well, having presented ninety-two concerts to more than fifty thousand persons and travelling over 14,000 miles through twenty-two states from coast to coast as official Good Will Ambassadors.

These choir members, since they come from such a wide area, are able to meet for rehearsal only once a week in a centrally located town. The rehearsals are necessarily long and hard because an entire concert program must be learned in six or seven rehearsals. These rehearsals usually run from seven to eight hours, but these young people do not mind because they have a job to do. They are taught correct breathing, posture, and voice production so that they can practice for hours without tiring. The Victory Choir is sponsored by the people of North Carolina and is presented here as a Good Will gesture and a contribution to civilian morale.

The Victory Concert program is especially arranged to fit today's need. Every one will enjoy the great American patriotic songs, folk songs, negro spirituals as only a Southern Choir can sing them, cowboy songs and great hymns of the Church. A capacity audience is expected to attend this Victory Concert. Let us Forward-March With Music.
