1.500 Wheat Growers **Insure 1943 Yields**

More than 1,500 North Carolina farmers already have obtained in-surance on their 1943 wheat crops, affording them protection against osses due to causes over which they have no control, according to G. T. Scott, chairman of the State AAA Committee, with headquarters at

The insurance is being offered farmers by the Federal Crop Insur-ance Corporation through county and community AAA committeemen, and otects yields against damage from il, windstorm, drouth, floods and other similar causes. The contracts guarantee growers 75 percent of the normal yield established for each

"Crop insurance is a vital part of wartime farming," Scott said. "Al-though the nation has vast reserves of wheat, loss of land, labor, and materials has no part in our agricul-tural production program. The in-surance protects the crop against losses which the grower could not ent, and even if he uses all his wheat on the farm, a guaranteed yield is an important item. All en-denmities are payable in wheat, or the cash equivalent, and this pro-tects the grower against lies of an
