1,500 Wheat Growers Insure 1943 Yields

More than 1,500 North Carolina farmers already have obtained insurance on their 1943 wheat crops, affording them protection against losses due to causes over which they have no control, according to G. T. Scott, chairman of the State AAA Committee, with headquarters at State College.

The insurance is being offered farmers by the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation through county and community AAA committees, and protects yields against damage from hail, windstorm, drought, floods and other similar causes. The contracts guarantee growers 75 percent of the normal yield established for each farm.

"Crop insurance is a vital part of wartime farming," Scott said. "Although the nation has vast reserves of wheat, loss of land, labor, and materials has no part in our agricultural production program. The insurance protects the crop against losses which the grower could not prevent, and even if he uses all his wheat on the farm, a guaranteed yield is an important item. All endowments are payable in wheat, or the cash equivalent, and this protects the grower against loss of an important commodity."

When contracts are written on the 1943 crop, the 1944 and 1945 yields also are automatically insured, Scott said. Premiums are payable annually, and the insurance may be cancelled by the grower if notice is given prior to seeding the second year crop.

Premium rates in North Carolina range from four-tenths to six-tenths of a bushel per acre, which at present prices is between 40 and 60 cents per acre. If the grower desires, he may obtain insurance without a cash payment, premiums being deducted from any endowment or any payments due him under the Agricultural Conservation Program, Scott said.

P. T. A. GARDEN PROJECT

Misinformation regarding acreage and helpers of the P. T. A. Garden Project referred to in our last issue, the Enterprise gladly gives space to the following letter in connection:

"To my friends and sponsors of the Farmville P. T. A. Garden project—The last issue of the Farmville Enterprise wave credit for a 15 acre garden plot in the P. T. A. garden project this year. Our garden is not that large. We have 4 acres on South Main street; 4 acres on W. Church street; 2 acres on W. Hines street; 6 acres on Pine street; 2.8 acres on Perry street, making a total of 11.6 acres.

"In our garden we now have 2.3 acres of lima beans from which I am expecting to gather some over a hundred bushels of beans within the next ten days; 8,000 heads of cabbage collards; 5,000 hills of sweet potatoes that should yield over a hundred bushels of potatoes. We have pulled and saved 200 bundles of fodder since cauning the corn from the stalk.

"I had only one helper, instead of eight, until June 1. We have had a very unfavorable spring and summer for our garden crop. It has been a pleasure to work for and with Mrs. Mattie Hooker, county supervisor, of the P. T. A. and sponsors of this project and I have tried my best to plant and cultivate a garden that you would be proud of. As foreman and gardener I invite you to visit the garden canning center and lunch room and make it your project. Perry Bundy.
