BIRD NOTES
 Guests in the garden at "Wingrest," home of Mrs. Z. C. Layton, of Maysville, Ky., the National Bird Chairman, were introduced to members of the Bird Club at the meeting Saturday, by Paschal Barrett. Paschal told of the nest of the ruby-throated hummingbird there, which had raised two families during the season. They built a fetid nest covering the outer side with small lichens from the bark of a tree this season, but they will use any material that is readily available for nesting purposes.
 A crow had also nested at "Wingrest" for the second time and Paschal told of how the mother Rough-winged Swallow pushes her babies out of the nest into the outside world when they are large enough to fly and must learn to care for themselves. Mrs. Layton stressed in her selection, read by Paschal, that protection from enemies and predators is the surest way to attract birds to one's garden.
