A WEEK OF THE WAR

(Continued from page 1) Industries is contemplated, he said, there is need for information which a compulsory registration could produce. Such a registration would require legislation which probably could not be completed till close to the end of the year. Labor Secretary Perkins reported 4,500,000 new workers must come into the labor market before the end of 1943 and an additional 3,000,000 by the end of 1944. War Manpower Commission Chairman McNutt said that about 500,000 workers will be released to war industries when nationwide gasoline rationing becomes effective November 22. Stabilization of Wages. The War Labor Board began to set up administrative machinery to regulate all wages and salaries under \$5,000 a year. The board will delegate to local Wage-Hour Administration officers the power to decide whether employers are exempt under the provisions permitting individual raises for merit, length of service or increased productivity. The board will establish 10 regional offices whose directors will meet in Washington with WLB officials to work out details for handling applications. The Treasury Department, which will control salaries not under WLB jurisdiction, established a salary stabilization unit and announced that seven regional offices of the unit will be opened soon. Stabilization of Farm Prices. The Agriculture Department estimated net farm income for 1942, including government payments, at nearly \$9,800 million, about \$1,000 million above the previous record in 1919, and set 1943 income at approximately \$10,500 million. Total agricultural production is nearly 12 percent greater than the record set in 1941, and 40 percent greater than in 1918. Military and Lend-Lease buying of food next year is expected to take one-fifth of current production. WMC Chairman McNutt said all "necessary" workers on the nation's dairy, livestock and poultry farms will be frozen in their present occupations. Local draft boards will be asked to defer such workers, all other employers will be instructed to refrain from hiring them, and the Agriculture Department will act toward stabilizing wages, he said. Rationing. Agriculture Secretary Wickard ordered 144 types of new farm machinery and equipment, excluding repair parts, frozen as of November 1 in the hands of dealers, distributors and manufacturers pending formal rationing. The Agriculture Department and its state war boards will establish state and county quotas. The WPB delegated to the Office of Price Administration the authority to ration milk cans and farm fencing. The OPA will redelegate this authority to the Agriculture Department. Sugar rations for Army and Navy personnel on furlough will be one-half pound per week, instead of on the basis of the value of the current sugar ration coupon. The first coffee ration will be obtained beginning November 22 by surrendering the last coupon, No. 28, in the sugar ration book, and subsequent rations will be given on coupons taken in sequence toward the center of the book.

QUESTION: What treatment should be given sheep for internal parasites? ANSWER: This has been a bad year for sheep losses from internal parasites, says L. I. Case, Extension animal husbandman of State College, and he suggests that the entire flock—including old and young sheep be given a dose of Phenothiazine in November or early December. The recommended dose is 25 grams, or approximately one ounce, for well grown yearling or adult sheep, slightly over one-half this amount for lambs over 60 pounds, and proportionately less for smaller sheep. QUESTION: Are any variety of flu-cured tobacco resistant to black root rot disease? ANSWER: The Agricultural Experiment Station of N. C. State College and the U. S. Department of Agriculture have recently developed two new flu-cured varieties, one of which is highly, and the other partly, resistant to black root rot disease. They are known now as "No. 400" and "No. 401." Further information about these new varieties may be obtained by writing to Dr. L. D. Farm Engineer Urges Paint For Machinery Very little new farm machinery will be manufactured for the duration, and D. S. Weaver, Extension agricultural engineer of N. C. State College, says it is absolutely essential that farmers protect and preserve the machinery they now have. Some machines will be irreplaceable, he declared, and failure to protect and preserve them may result in not only an individual, but a National loss. "Rust is one of the chief enemies of farm machinery," said Weaver. "Most paints form a protective covering over the metal, but only red lead paint will actually prevent rust." The farm engineer says that ready-prepared red lead paints are available, and the only caution is to secure a high class product. Sheep

paint is a mistake at any time, says Weaver, and particularly at this time. Standard brands turned out by reliable manufacturers should be used. Some farmers prefer to make up their own paint. The Extension specialist suggests the following directions in preparation of homemade paint: 1. By volume, mix three parts of dry red lead and one part of raw linseed oil. Allow this mixture to stand at least three days so the oil will thoroughly wet the dry red lead. 2. Thin the paste to painting consistency with an equal volume of thinning mixture composed of six parts of raw linseed oil, two parts of turpentine, and one part of liquid drier. 3. Stir thoroughly and strain out lumps of foreign material. You can not stir too much, and frequently paint is stirred too little.
