HERTFORD BOY IS HERO IN ARMED GUARD FORCE

Friends of Lt. (jg) Rufus T. Brinn, Hertford, nephew of Mrs. Wesley E. Willis and Mrs. M. V. Horton, were interested in the article in Sunday's News and Observer, which carried the story of the heroism of this 23 year old officer. The news article gave an account of his voyages and of the bravery displayed by Gun Crew I-E, the first Armed Guard crew to be organized, the first assigned to a merchant vessel, and the first to be decorated with the Navy Silver Star medal. Through storms including blizzards, and many adventures involving the hazards of ice floes in the passage of Norway's North Cape and dive-bombing of enemy planes his ship came through.

A picture is shown of Rear Admiral Edward J. Marquart pinning the Silver Star on Lt. Brinn's uniform. The young officer is a Duke-University graduate and commands the first Armed Guard crew to be organized by the Navy. The adventures of the officer and his men are hair-raising.

The story is concluded with the following comment: "The wonderful thing about the Armed Guard," says Lieutenant Brinn, "is that you get to spend your winters in Russia and your summers in Africa."

larger quantities, the Eastern fuel oil situation continues to worsen. New restrictions have been placed on consumption of fuel oil and kerosene by space heaters other than furnaces. Those who use oil or kerosene stoves must apply for fuel rations on a basis of not more than 550 square feet of floor area per heater unless it can be proved that the equipment must actually heat a larger total area. And all those persons, except private home owners, who apply for fuel oil rations for heating apartments, office buildings, institutions and the like, must prove that the furnaces cannot be converted to coal burning before they receive further fuel oil.

More and more, the country's wholesalers and retailers are becoming a vital part of the war program of price control and commodity distribution under Government regulations. The fundamentals of coffee rationing will be simply and graphically explained in words and pictures in hundreds of thousands of food stores throughout the country. Store-keepers will be expected to see that their customers adhere to the rationing program, and count all coffee on hand November 28, as part of their ration. Restaurants, hotels, and institutions will be entitled to as much coffee, less stocks on hand, from November 22 through January 31, as they used in September and October. Coffee inventories of retailers and wholesalers at the start of rationing may be obtained from supplies through "purchase warrants" issued by the purchasers, instead of using purchase certificates issued by local boards as was done under sugar rationing.

Retailers To Push War Drives.
The Nation's retail industry has pledged its promotion facilities to cooperation in a basic Government program of war campaigns, starting in January. This program will be linked with retail promotion and advertising, and will stress the importance of salvage, tire conservation, gas rationing, saving household equipment and cooking gas, other home aids, and war bonds and stamps.
