BIRD NOTES Paschall Barrett told about the Chimney Swift at the last meeting of the Bird Club. These birds roost in large numbers in chimneys but usually nest one pair to a chimney. The nest is several feet from the top, anywhere from two to twenty feet down. It is a little shelf made of small tips and stuck together with a sort of gummy substance from the bird's mouth. The eggs, four to six, are pure white, and both birds sit on them for nineteen days, changing places at least every thirty minutes. The young birds do not open their eyes for two weeks. The Chimney Swift spends its whole life catching insects. The bill seems small but when it opens its mouth it is really huge. By early November the last ones leave the Southern United States and no one knows where they go. It is thought by some people that they winter in South America.
