BIRD CLUB NOTES

Wilber Bennett told the Bird Club members about the turkey vulture which is a large, glossy, black and brown cartoon-feeding bird and as scavengers their service makes them invisible to the South. Their vision is marvelous and it is generally believed that they find their prey more by sight than by smell, sailing low over the ground while the black vulture spy the body of an animal while sailing in spirals high up in the air.

The vulture is awkward, uncouth, with an ugly featherless red head and neck. However, sailing through the air on immovable, outstretched wings, it is a thing of grace and beauty. At times it maintains itself in the air for hours without seeming to flap its wings and this has long been a subject of study by inventors; the great birds are credited with being the inspiration of the American-invented airplane. The eggs are laid in a depression in the ground under fallen limbs, in the hollow base of a tree or in the midst of a cane brake. The eggs are only two in number.

Billie Russell related the story of Lieutenant Commander T. Eric Reynolds' study of birds in the South Pacific. He has been interested in ornithology since early boyhood and in his rare moments from medical duties, even in the grime of war, it provides him with a fascinating diversion.

War Stamp Sales Over Half Billion Dollars, Album Drive Opens



Appealing Margaret C. Russell of the War Savings Stamp Staff looks up this new Treasury poster which will be seen from coast to coast. It pictures retailers slogan, "SAY YES." A drive is underway for Americans to buy additional War Savings to fill albums and convert them into War Bonds.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The nation's retailers from the tiniest hamlets to the mighty cities are acting as a spearhead in a great Treasury Department campaign to sell the additional War Savings Stamps needed to fill more than 100,000,000 albums now in the hands of the American people.

According to a report released by the Treasury Department today, sales of War Savings Stamps totaled \$599,777,000 for the period from May 1, 1941, through November, 1942.

Stamp sales have risen from less than three million dollars per month when they were first introduced to the public to an average of more than fifty million dollars per month at the present time.

The Treasury's slogan, "A half-filled album is like a half-equipped soldier," has been adopted officially by retailers for the campaign.

The importance of the drive is seen in the fact that a War Bond potential of nearly two billion dollars hangs in the balance.

Every War Stamp album, converted into a People's Bond, for which the purchaser pays \$18.75 and which matures to \$25.00 value when held for 10 years, adds its force to the war effort.

The Treasury Department is counting upon the country's school children to play a powerful role in the success of the SAY YES drive. The volume of stamp and bond sales is at the rate of \$200,000,000 for the current school year.
