**State College Hints  
For Farm Homemakers**

A home should be more than four  
walls and a roof. It should be a  
place to live—a place to work, to  
rest, to stay. As we conserve the  
many vital materials that are im-  
portant to our national safety, we  
should also conserve our homes, the  
place important to our family safety.  
Ask yourself this question, "will my  
house last for the duration?"

In order to keep a house in good  
condition one must give it constant  
care. All defects should be given  
prompt attention, as this prevents  
making major repairs at a later date.

A house can be no stronger than  
its foundation. If cracks occur or  
the mortar becomes chalky and falls  
out, it should be replaced immedi-  
ately with new mortar. If foundations  
must be made of logs or wooden  
blocks, they should be treated with  
cresote to protect them from insects  
and moisture. Chimneys frequently  
are the first part of a house to de-  
teriorate. Care in repairing them is  
essential for safety, efficiency, and  
appearance.

To keep a home in good condition,  
one must regularly inspect the war-  
ter boarding and supporting frame-  
work of the building. Siding boards  
which are loose should be re-nailed  
and the old nail holes filled with  
putty. Wall or ceiling boards should  
be replaced with new ones. Paint  
work should be kept up as well as  
the roof.

prominent local white citizens at the  
colored school, Wednesday night of  
March 17th. Our beloved Mayor  
presided over the meeting. Brief,  
but inspiring remarks were made by  
several white citizens who represent-  
ed various civilian defense organiza-  
tions.

Every local Negro defense organi-  
zation was well represented. The  
Negro fire company was almost one  
hundred percent present, and heard  
words of praise, as well as instruc-  
tions, by their Fire Chief, Mr. Hay-  
wood Smith. He praised the com-  
pany for their loyal and unselfish  
devotion to the noble task of reduc-  
ing the loss of life and property by  
fire.

The First Aiders, the auxiliary  
firemen, the fire wardens, the police  
helpers and Red Cross workers were  
all out in large numbers as evidence  
of their undying devotion to the  
Stars and Stripes. All of these aux-  
iliaries were given words of praise  
and inspiration by leaders in the  
various branches of service.

The white citizens, present, man-  
ifested the opinion that the Negro  
citizenship of this community was  
making progress in the things that  
go to make up a better and more de-  
sirable type of citizenship and ex-  
pressed their willingness to help  
whenever and wherever they could.

The meeting closed with everyone  
highly inspired to give more work  
and make greater sacrifices that the  
Star Spangled Banner might ever con-  
tinue to wave over the land of the  
free and the home of the brave.

**MEATS**

Meat racketeers and chiseling  
operators have made a "Permit Sys-  
tem" of slaughtering necessary for  
all those who sell meat. No permit  
is required for farmers unless they  
deliver meat to others.

**COTTON**

Loans may now be obtained on  
cotton stored on farms. It must be  
sampled and classed by proper au-  
thorities and the storage building  
must be approved.

**STATE COLLEGE  
ANSWERS TIMELY  
FARM QUESTIONS**

QUESTION: Will the spray treat-  
ment successfully "cure" blue mold  
after the disease has infected tobacco  
plant beds?

ANSWER: The copper oxide-cot-  
tonseed oil spray method of control-  
ling blue mold in tobacco plant beds  
is a preventive measure, and is not  
very effective where plants are al-  
ready diseased, according to Howard  
Garris, extension plant pathologist  
at N. C. State College. The para-  
dichlorobenzene (P. D. B.) fumiga-  
tion treatment is effective either as  
a preventive or as a "cure." These  
two treatments are recommended by  
State College specialists.

QUESTION: Can I change an old  
building on my farm into a brooder  
house?

ANSWER: Yes. The poultry in-  
dustry is one of adaptation. Grow-  
ers, taking up poultry for the first  
time, will find it economical to utilize  
buildings already available such as  
barns, horse, pack houses and other  
buildings. No single recommenda-  
tion can be given, but certain funda-  
mental conditions of ventilation and  
lighting must be kept in mind, ac-  
cording to C. D. Duggan, who is in  
charge of the extension work at  
N. C. State College. When build-  
ings are to be used for brooding,  
they should be kept clean and well  
ventilated. The matter is a  
subject of great importance.

cotton seed before planting?  
ANSWER: Yes, yes, yes! Dr.  
Luther Shaw, experiment station  
plant pathologist at N. C. State Col-  
lege, says that North Carolina grow-  
ers lose about 150 million pounds of  
seed cotton every year in a poor  
stand and that an outstanding fac-  
tor causing poor stands is the disease  
known as damping-off. It can be  
controlled through proper seed treat-  
ment. Materials for treating may be  
secured at local seed, hardware and  
drug stores.

Germes of the damping-off disease  
are usually present on all cotton seed  
less than two years old. Boll rots  
and rainy weather during the har-  
vesting season lead to a high degree  
of seed contamination. By all means  
treat your cotton seed in 1943.
