TOP MILK PRODUCER

HAZARDVILLE, CONN. - Even though he suffered an injury to his hand in a slage cutter, which prevented him from milking, F. J. Mitchell, shown above, with his 17-month-old son, established himself as the top milk producer in Connecticut last year. Mr. Mitchell, assisted by his wife, still does all the back work on their farm where they now have a herd of 20 milk cows, 19 of them milking three times a day. These large milking machines solve this problem. Despite the shortage and the increasing demands for production caused by the war, Mr. and Mrs. Mitchell are working toward a show-up in which they feel they will carry off a substantial national title. Last year in Mitchell's new herd appeared 100,000 pounds of milk with a butterfat content of 3.7 per cent and 11,000 pounds of fat.
