STATE COLLEGE ANSWERS TIMELY FARM QUESTIONS

QUESTION: Can you tell me how to build a creep for feeding beef calves?

ANSWER: Yes. Extension Feeder No. 49, "Creep Feeding Beef Calves," carries this information and a free copy may be obtained by writing to the Agricultural Editor, State College, Raleigh.

QUESTION: Are all varieties of peanuts subject to the leafspot disease?

ANSWER: Yes. All varieties of peanuts are susceptible to the leaf-spot disease which causes premature defoliation of the plants, and also to damage from leafhoppers which cause burning of the tips and margins of the leaves.

QUESTION: How can aphids be controlled?

ANSWER: Use either a nicotine spray or nicotine dust, says J. Myron Maxwell, extension entomologist at N. C. State College.
