Prominent Educator Laid to Rest Here

Miss Alice Johnston Hines, 82, a native of this community and a well known educator, who had won distinction and signal honor in her chosen field in both North Carolina and Kentucky, was laid to rest here beside her parents, Robert W. and Belle R. Hines, Sunday afternoon, in Forest Hill cemetery, following rites held in the Christian Church where she and her forebears are honored and beloved as pioneer members of old Antioch Church, the first house of God to be erected in Farmville, and where she received her religious training and pointed the way for others herself as a teacher. Many Farmville citizens today remember her as their first Sunday School teacher.

Surviving are two nephews, T. H. Hines of Charlotte, formerly of Salisbury, and James W. Hines of Belhaven; and one niece, Mrs. Marvin Robbins of Rocky Mount.

She was a sister of the late J. W. Hines of Rocky Mount.

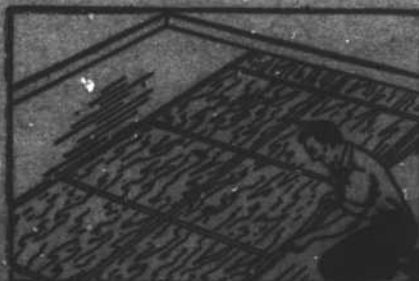
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
