BIRD CLUB

Zeb Whitehurst, at Saturday's Bird Club meeting, read an article entitled "The Reason a Goose Starved," which told of the difference in birds that swim and those that wade and scratch. Geese, it was learned, belong to the swimmers and feed on plant roots and stems under water. They are especially fitted for this by the fact that they have a large amount of fat on their bodies under the feathers and skin and this keeps them from feeling the cold. They also have a thick coat of down next to the skin so that even though the outside feathers get wet this down keeps the water from getting to the skin. They have a great deal of oil on their feathers which keeps the feathers from getting wet, as the feathers of a chicken do.

These swimmers have webbed feet. Although the web is not the same on all the different kinds. Many have a broad flat bill so they can gather up large mouthfuls when eating and wash it clean by sucking the water back and forth. Some have very small wings and spend nearly all their time in the water as they fly only when the wind is right. The swimmers are ducks, geese, swans, pelicans, sea-gulls, and loons. The waders are cranes, storks, snipes, sand-pipers, herons, etc. They have very small or no webs on their feet and so cannot swim rapidly. They have long legs and wade along the shores of rivers and streams catching frogs and minnows. Some of these waders use the long bill for picking up worms and insects on land.

There is a group of birds, like chickens, turkeys, quails, pheasants and guinea that have strong feet and legs with stout nails so they can scratch in the dirt for their food. They have heavy plump bodies and while they fly very rapidly they fly only short distances before landing.

By studying the differences in the bodies, swimmers and waders it is easy to distinguish which family group a bird belongs to.
