Highly Esteemed Farmville Woman Passes; Interment Made in Hollywood Cemetery

Funeral services for Miss Josie Hearne, highly esteemed Farmville woman, who died Tuesday evening, were held late Wednesday afternoon from the Presbyterian Church. The choir rendered "How Firm A Foundation," "In The Sweet Bye and Bye," and "The Church is My Home," and Elbert C. Holmes, baritone, sang "Then We'll Understand" in the church services, and "Abide With Me" was used at the graveside. Interment was made in Hollywood cemetery beneath a lovely floral offering.

In accordance with service plans left by Miss Hearne, which were impressive and of an inspirational nature, Rev. Mr. Lynch read Psalms 23 and 27. Paying tribute to Miss Hearne, the minister referred to her great faith, loyalty to the Church, sweetness of disposition, beauty of character and to her Christian fortitude, which sustained her throughout an illness of several years. The theme of his brief remarks was, "Blessed Are They That Die In The Lord."

Miss Hearne was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Joseph J. Hearne. Her family moved to Farmville from Edgecombe county during her childhood and she spent her entire life here, where she made many friends, to whom she was a source of great inspiration through her resignation to pain and a keen interest maintained in Church and community affairs and in world events.

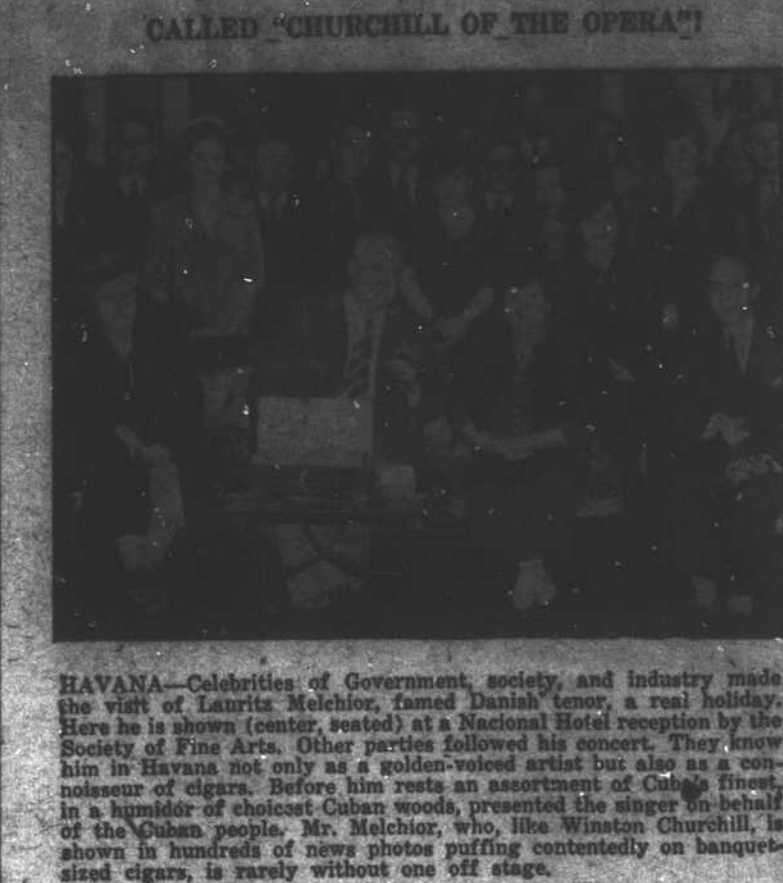

**BIRD CLUB.**  
 Donnie Bryan warned the club members that the long lean back-alley cat with no home and a large family of kittens will devour the last of the cardinal's young ones with a gulp, knock down a robin, and lie in ambush half a way for a mockingbird. She is a greater enemy of birds than snakes, squirrels, hawks, foxes and owls and should not be allowed to roam at will.

George Manning read an article saying for six thousand years the Eagle has had more symbolic attributes than any other bird in the world. By the Act of Congress June 20, 1782, the Bald Eagle was officially made our National Emblem and it was formally launched at the time of President Washington's first inauguration, April 30, 1789, in New York City.

The image of the Bald Eagle is engraved on the Coat of Arms of the Great Seal of the United States; it appears on the President's flag and on many of our coins as well as on those of many foreign countries.

When a pair of Eagles mate they dwell in true conjugal fidelity until one dies, whereupon the one surviving chooses a new companion. They travel in pairs, not in flocks, and attack any foe bird, beast or human being in defense of their young. One of the most remarkable characteristics of this bird is its sight. It has been known to see its prey at least two miles away.
