ORDINANCE REGULATING TRASH ON STREETS

"Whereas many persons have persisted in placing weeds, rubbish and trash on the streets and in the curbs on Saturdays, holidays and Sundays; and whereas, it is impractical to move said weeds, rubbish and trash on days mentioned and it is necessary for it to stay over-night and another day before being removed;
And whereas such action constitutes a condition both unsightly and unsanitary; and whereas it is the desire of the Town Officials to keep the streets clean at all times:
Now Therefore Be It Ordained that it shall be unlawful for any person to place garbage, weeds, trash and rubbish on the streets, curb or sidewalk on Saturdays, Sundays or holidays.
Anyone violating this ordinance shall be punishable by a fine of \$5.00 and cost;
This ordinance to be in full force and effect from and after August 1, 1943."

A Message To The Tobacco Farmers of North Carolina

On Saturday, July 24th, the Tobacco Growers are again given the opportunity to go to the polls and express their approval of tobacco quotas for the next three years.
Under the National Emergency, quotas on all other commodities have been suspended. We owe a debt of gratitude to Congress for preserving our program.
We think that the economic value of quotas has been demonstrated beyond a reasonable doubt to the farmers of this state.
This is the most important tobacco referendum that we have ever held, and we urge every landowner, tenant and sharecropper to go out and vote in this election. If we as tobacco growers, who receive the benefits of this legislation, through neglect or indifference, fail to go out and overwhelmingly register our approval, then we will greatly handicap our Congressmen when they attempt to pass additional legislation in the future.
Let's keep our program, modify it to meet changing conditions, and go into the post war period with a program that will guarantee to us a decent standard of living out of the production of flue cured tobacco.
Let's all DO our duty SATURDAY, JULY 24th, and obtain 100 percent participation in this referendum.
