It is interesting too, to watch them performing their ablutions in the bird bath while other birds patiently await their turn.

A morning or afternoon, or both, spent here among the trees, bushes, Myriads of wild flowers and the birds are well worth any bird lover's time, for he will be rewarded by the sight of birds who have come to stay or the north birds who stop for a visit before taking off for their final destinations.
