BIRD CLUB NOTES

George Manning read an article on the Cuckoo at Saturday's Bird Club meeting. Birds of the Cuckoo family are long-tailed; mostly arboreal, but sometimes terrestrial and ground-scratching. The toes are arranged in pairs, two pointing forward and two backward. There are eight to ten feathers in the tail.

The young are hatched naked. The nest is of very rude construction, the eggs are extremely variable as to coloration and number and are usually deposited at intervals so that eggs and young are often found in the nest at the same time.

As a rule the Cuckoos are birds of dull plumage, a more or less plain grayish brown or partly rufous coloration prevailing. Both the yellow-billed and black-billed species are known as the "Ruin Crow" because of the belief—especially among farmers—that their guttural cry predicts rain. His preferred menu of tent caterpillars, of which he destroys great numbers, places him in the category of highly useful birds.
