Home and farm agents have been called together in district meetings during the past two weeks by the Agricultural Extension Service of State College to make plans for meeting the war goals for food and feed in 1944.

It is important to save this crop of sweet potatoes, to cure and store them properly so that this great supply of food shall not be lost for human consumption, declare extension horticulturists at State College.

Save and store every ounce of feed possible this year in the form of hay, silage, root crops, grain, and meals, suggest livestock specialists at State College, who believe the feed situation will get worse before it gets better.

"No idle acres this winter," is a slogan being adopted by leading N. C. farmers concerned over the present situation in the supply of feed for livestock. Small grains and legumes will be planted universally.

#### BIRD CLUB NOTES

Charles Fitzgerald read an article at Saturday's Bird Club meeting on the Swallow Family by Charles Darrow, one of the "Quits Kids." These birds belong to a very large family, having many European, Asiatic, and African relatives. All their habits of living and home building are much the same. They are classed as cave dwellers living in colonies in little burrows on the side of cliffs, sandy banks, quarry or gravel pits. Bank Swallows or Sand Martins, the smallest of the swallow family, combine and build regular cities by burrowing into caves or building little mud houses, one after another, like an apartment house. It is surprising how each bird knows his own residence, although they look exactly alike and there are no less than fifty or sixty holes or nests in a surface of twenty square feet. The depths of the tunnels differ from eight to twelve feet with such a tiny bird and each one cannot imagine how these little birds are able to burrow into the cliff. The birds are deposited at the end of the tunnel where the hole is made of some mud, hay and feathers. The birds dig their tunnels in a straight line and each is attached to others in a series of tunnels. It is said that some species of swallows make their nests in a similar way. It is to be seen that the birds are very intelligent. The birds are very intelligent.

#### State College Hints For Farm Homemakers

When the front door swells, the bureau drawers stick, the dining table warps, and the ironing board bulges, blame the weather, say wood experts. Wood, especially unfinished wood, absorbs moisture from the air in warm humid weather and swells. While the wood is swollen, not much can be done except to ease tight places by rubbing with wax. But later when heat has dried out the house and brought the wood back to normal size, coat the under side of tables and other unfinished wood surfaces with varnish or wax to prevent the wood from taking in so much moisture again.

The bulged board that adds to home ironing difficulties is a problem to many homemakers. Ironing boards are usually unfinished, and kept in damp laundries or kitchens. In ironing, steam from damp clothes is driven down into the wood. Wood experts advise buying a thoroughly seasoned board at least an inch and a half thick, because thick wood warps less than thin, and giving it several all-over coats of good spar varnish. Cleats of hard wood nailed to the under side of the board help hold it flat. Keep the board in a dry place.

If you must peel potatoes ahead of time and keep them soaking before cooking, put them in salt water rather than fresh water and save vitamin C, advise experiment specialists. Though potatoes lose some crispness in salt water, they hold more vitamin C and are excellent both in flavor and texture after cooking.

There are no marketing quotas on cotton this fall but the wise farmer will keep an accurate record of his ginnings and sales so as to have a history of his crop if some new Government program should be adopted in the future, caution agronomy specialists at State College.


