certificates obtained at local War Price and Rationing Boards. MEATS, FATS—Red Stamps X, Y, and Z good through October 2.

PROCESSED FOODS—Blue stamps U, V, and W expires October 20th.

BURLAP BAG QUOTAS REMOVED

Quotas on farmers' and packers' purchases of new burlap bags for packing certain agricultural products have been removed for the balance of 1945.

NO DATES ON KEROSENE COUPONS

Persons who use small amounts of kerosene for domestic cooking and lighting may now get renewal rations for periods longer than the six months formerly permitted.

APPROVAL FOR USE OF GUTTERS

Approval for use of gutters, spouting, conductor pipes, and fittings in dwellings of two stories or less must be obtained from the War Production Board under a recent amendment to order M-126.

PRICES SET FOR DRY BEANS

Sales of dry edible beans, 1945 crop, to the Food Distribution Administration, to other country shippers, and to other governmental agencies designated in Food Distribution Order No. 45 can be made at either of two sets of prices—maximum prices established for the commodity or support prices set for specified classes last April by the War Food Administration.

RESTRICT DRY ONION SHIPMENT

To insure orderly distribution for the available supply of dry onions to the armed forces and civilians, all shipments in excess of 100 pounds in the 12 principal onion-producing states have been put on a permit basis by the Office of Defense Transportation and the Interstate Commerce Commission.

SUGAR TO SAVE BEES

Beekeepers who are facing loss of their bees because of lack of sufficient natural food, may obtain additional sugar allotments if they are registered with OPA as industrial users.

CABBAGE SEED CEILING PRICES

Ceiling prices for 1945 cabbage seed have been made the same as for the 1944 crop, according to a recent OPA amendment.

SHRIMP PRICES CUT

Consumer prices for fresh shrimp may be 40 to 50 percent less because of a recent OPA amendment setting prices in accord with the 1942 average prices for shrimp.

HOUSING DOWN PAYMENTS CUT

Down payments required to buy housing in rent-controlled areas has been reduced from 33 1/3 percent to 25 percent. OPA amended the regulation because of easing in the housing situation.

GASOLINE FOR SCHOOL BUSES

School buses in districts where school authorities have delayed in filing necessary applications or have failed to designate routes in accordance with the school bus conservation order may get temporary gasoline allotments. The Office of Defense Transportation authorized this action.

REFUGEE JOINS WAC

A German-born naturalized American, who had her mother land to support the dependents of the Navy, has enlisted as a private in the Women's Army Corps and is in training at the First WAC Training Center, Fort Detrick, near Ft. Belvoir, Colorado.
