BURLAP BAG QUOTAS

REMOVED otas on farmess' and packers' ses of new burlap bags for packing certain agricultural prod-ucts have been removed for the balance of 1948, "Certain agricu products" includes, but is not limited to, beans, cotton, feed, flour, meal, to, beans, cotton, feed, flour, meal, fruits, potatoes, vegetables, and to-bacco. The restriction on the bag sizes permitted for certain commodities has been relaxed to allow an additional size for each of two types of seed. A ½-bushel-bag is allowed for hybird seed corn, a 8-bushel bag. for cottonseed. These are in addition to the sizes previously permit-

NO DATES ON KEROSENE COUPONS

Persons who use small amounts of kerosene for domestic cooking and lighting may now get renewal ra-tions for periods longer than the six months formerly permitted. This provision of a recent OPA amendment is to reduce the number of re-newal applications by the consumer and the amount of paper work per-formed by the rationing board. The amendment provides that rations issued for domestic cooking and lighting no longer will bear dates of issuance and expiration, and coupons may be used as long as they last. The rationing board may issue the ration for any period up to a year from date of application. The maximum ration allowed for domestic cooking has been increased to 30 gal-lons a month for the first seven persons. It was formerly 24 gallons for six or seven persons.
