Plan Farm Shop Construction Now

G. W. Giles, agricultural engineer of the State College Experiment Station, urges all North Carolin farmers to have repair shops on their premises in which to repair their farm machinery this winter.

farm machinery this winter. Is offers these suggestions as a help in the construction of the shops. First, he says, there is no stand-ard type of shop. It might be a corner in the barn, a part of the machine shed or garage, or a separ-ate building. The important thing is to set aside a definite location that provides a place for every wrench and boit. However, the ideal shop is one partitioned off as the end of the machine shed. Eightran by twenty feet is the perfect size floor space, as it must be great smough to permit the repair of any size of farm machinery dur-ing bad weather.


