**State College Hints For Farm Homemakers**

Better breakfast. Working people and school children need better breakfast in order to do more efficient work and not become too tired. A good breakfast includes fruit or fruit juice, milk, cereal — natural whole grain or enriched, or those restored to whole grain value — eggs (or meat), bread and butter. These foods are packed full of nourishment.

Restore the Old Soup Kettle. Keep a soup jar in the refrigerator; into it put all leftover liquid from vegetables. When you are ready to make soup chopped green vegetable (to increase mineral and vitamin content) may be added to this soup stock. No food of any kind should go to waste.

Stocking Runs. Sew up silk stocking runs with a thread raveled from stockings that have been discarded. The mend is almost invisible and stocking thread is more durable than sewing thread.

Provide Family Recreation. The slogan "The family which plays together stays together" is more appropriate now that gasoline and tires are rationed.

**BIRD CLUB**

Paschal Barrett read a story about a "Vireo at Home" at Saturday's Bird Club meeting. According to the story—in Merdon, a little New Hampshire Village, everyone is kind to the birds. They feed them in winter, provide nesting boxes and plenty of water. The birds even have a place which was once a farm but now a Bird Sanctuary where they can do just as they like without fear that anyone will disturb them. Here everything is done to make the feathered friends feel at home. They know they are safe so they love it and enjoy living there because of the kindnesses of their human friends.

The Vireo nest hangs below a twig like a small basket or cradle and is composed of fine vegetable fibers, mosses and lichens. The eggs are white, usually spotted. The Red Eyed Vireo in this story became so tame she would eat from the fingers and did not object to being lifted off of the nest so eggs could be seen. The Vireo is grayish green on top and white underneath. Insect food is gleaned from the foliage of shrubs and trees. Probably more than span worms and leaf rollers are destroyed by the Vireo than by any other one group of birds.

After the program the members were invited to the basement where Jack-o-lanterns, cards, whistles and pumpkins were used as decorations. Cookies, orange drinks and halibut candy were served from a table with a white cloth on a center piece. What a wonderful time.

NEWSPAPER PULPWOOD COMMITTEE

Next Thursday is Armistice Day. In other years that day has been dedicated to the memory of the men who gave their lives in World War I. But this year we believe those honored dead would rather join with us, the living, in paying honor to the men of another generation who have taken up the weapons that fell from their lifeless hands.

This year we in this community are asked to observe Armistice Day not with words but with deeds. This year we have a special responsibility.

This Armistice Day marks the beginning of a new drive to make up the shortage in pulpwood. Everyone who can possibly do so is asked to cut an extra cord in honor of some friend or relative in the service.

There are two good reasons for putting the drive on this basis.

First, it takes nearly a ton of pulpwood to supply each man in the service with the many things he needs.

Second, the present pulpwood shortage, 2½ million cords, is just about equal to the number of service men who come from the pulpwood-producing areas.

So if every one of us in this and other pulpwood-cutting communities cuts an extra cord for our service man, the emergency will be met. No fighting man will lack any of the thousand-and-one war essentials that are made from pulpwood.
