State College Hints For Farm Homemakers

Grime can best be removed from dirty work clothes by soaking them in a solution of kerosene and water.

Soak clothes in the kerosene water for about half an hour, or until you can see that dirt and grime are pretty well loosened up.

Rinse clothes well—two or three rinses at least—to remove every bit of kerosene and soap.

A starched appearance is desirable in most work clothes. For heavy ones, such as overalls, add two cups of washed starch to last rinse water.

For lighter-weights work clothes a thin starch will add a smooth finish that keeps clothes clean longer.

Keep it working, Mrs. America! Take care of your electric refrigerator. Clean the exterior with warm, soapy water—no harsh abrasives or cleaners.

Clean the interior of the cabinet, including shelves and freezing compartments, with a mild solution of warm water and baking soda (1 teaspoon of soda to 3 quarts of water).

Remove the drawers from the refrigerator and wash them with the same solution.

BIRD NOTES

Charles Fitzgerald read an article on the Myrtle Warbler, which has a spring moult as well as the usual one in the fall. The birds change to their bright summer plumage in April and early May. They are usually seen in North Carolina in their dull winter outfit as they arrive in October and leave before the moult has been acquired.

The winter birds are brownish with the markings dull and obscure. The four yellow patches are always present and the yellow rump is particularly noticeable and is a positive identification. They breed throughout much of Canada and South to New York State and winter from the Ohio valley and New Jersey to Panama and over the whole State of North Carolina.

The food consists largely of berries of the myrtle, sumac, poison ivy, holly and cedar. Literally thousands swarm among the youpons and cedars along the Bogus Banks near Beaufort and near the mouth of New River in Onslow County.
