Mrs. Humber Speaks To D. A. R. Chapter

The January meeting of the Major Benjamin May Chapter, D. A. R., held at the home of Mrs. E. B. Beasley, Fountain, with Mrs. J. O. Pollard as joint hostess, was characterized by splendid attendance and enthusiasm, and featured with an inspiring talk on "Post War Thinking," by Mrs. Robert E. Humber, of Greenville, a charming Frenchwoman, who lived in Paris just prior to its occupation by the Nazis.

Mrs. Humber introduced her subject by saying that "Victory is only a means to an end," and by repeating the question that is used as a headline these days by publications in every country, "Beyond Victory, What?" She read an appeal from oppressed and imprisoned Greek women, addressed to Free Women of All the World, that gripped the heart and stirred the soul of every woman listening. The only ray of hope contained in the letter was that "Tomorrow when our sufferings are over we want you to promise that you will see that there is created a new world free from war and destruction."

The speaker reminded her hearers that the interdependence of nations had been brought to the fore by this global war and impressed the fact that nations must seek a better understanding and through study prepare intelligently to influence the conditions of the future peace. She stressed the need for study in the family circle and in neighborhood groups and stated that "this is the Crusade of the 20th Century in which everyone must enlist, unless the people, internationally speaking, wish a few wilful men to write the peace so dearly won." Mrs. Humber concluded by reading a Meditation on America.

Miss Eunice McGee introduced the guest speaker, who was presented with a corsage by the hostesses.

Mrs. G. Alex Rouse, first vice regent, presided; Mrs. M. V. Jones led the singing of "America"; Miss Tabitha DeVisconti the Salute to the Flag, and Mrs. C. S. Eagles gave a meditation based on Madame Chiang Kai Shek's confession of faith in the Christian religion.

Mrs. M. V. Jones gave an account of the visit which she and Mrs. P. E. Jones made to Camp Lejeune in behalf of the Chapter during the holidays. Misses Anne Jones and Jane Greene accompanied them and assisted in dispensing cheer and in distributing gifts from the members to wounded service men.
