Farmville Colored School Closing

Wednesday night, May 30, marked the closing exercises of the Farmville colored school, for this year. This exercise was noted for the beauty of its simplicity. There was no imported speaker. The class built its own program with its own talent. The speakers were Miss Mattie Lou Dupree, vaudeictorian, and Miss Antie Belle Wooten, of Falkland, salutatorian. Special remarks were made by Rev. Willoughby, Farmville, and Rev. Simon Hemby, of Fountain. In a simple but very impressive ceremony, principal H. B. Sugg presented diplomas to thirty-two graduates. This was the largest class in the history of the school. During the "Open House" hundreds of people from all walks of life and from both far and near, inspected the inside work of the school. The classroom exhibits received very high compliments. The home economics department exhibited a completely balanced meal at the lowest cost and articles of clothing from the apron to the coat suit. The industrial arts department exhibited articles of house-hold furniture from the coffee table to complete bed room suites with beautiful hand made dresser lamps. Both the boys and the girls along with the instructors, received high compliments for their interest and efficiency in this field. These exhibits would have done credit to any industrial institution. The white citizenship of Farmville and immediate community, has manifested the feeling that through and by a long period of incessant labor which has given evidence of progress toward a better community, in general, the school, as a whole, has warranted the support and admiration of the entire community and has pledged its support to any move toward a more adequate school plant for the colored people just as soon as the "lights go on again." The white citizenship has always manifested a very sincere interest in the colored school and its philosophy of education and has helped it in many ways, too numerous to mention here. For these many deeds of kindness the colored citizenship wishes to openly express its deepest appreciation. The number of prisoners of war for agricultural work in the U.
