

Poppy Day Will Be Held May 25

Poppy Day will be observed in Pitt County and throughout the United States on Saturday, May 25. Mrs. James R. Worsley, president of Pitt County unit of the American Legion Auxiliary, has announced.

Memorial poppies to be worn in honor of the dead of both world wars will be distributed on the streets throughout the day by volunteer workers from the auxiliary and co-operating organizations. Contributions received in exchange for the flowers will be used in relief and rehabilitation work for disabled veterans, their families and the families of the dead.

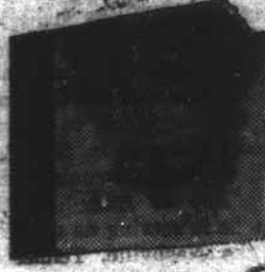

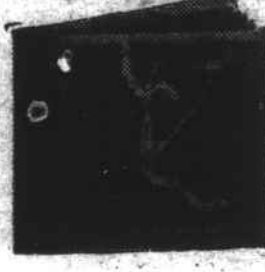
