In desperation from the lack of response from our knitters in the past year, a letter was written to area headquarters requesting some disposition of the yarn we have on hand. Could anything be more eloquent than the reply which we quote:

"We are distressed to learn that you are having so much difficulty with the knitting program in the Pitt County Chapter. Quotas, assigned before the cessation of hostilities, are still needed. The many thousands of men still on guard duty in foreign countries must be furnished supplementary warm clothing, which the army does not supply, and countless numbers of men in military hospitals are cheered by the comfort articles made by Red Cross volunteers. Aside from this, we have assumed the added responsibility of supplying veterans administration hospitals with comfort articles. This is a job which will go on for years."

Can the knitters of Pitt County, who responded so dutifully during the war years, turn down this appeal for continued knitting? We think not, and we hope that before the knitting room closes for the summer, much wool will be taken out for knitting during the summer months.
