**NO IMPROVEMENT EXPECTED
IN FERTILIZER SUPPLY**

The potash supply available to North Carolina farmers during the next fertilizer season may be slightly less than during the 1944-45 crop year, superphosphate is now running short of demand, and nitrogen is expected to be placed under Government allocation soon to guarantee equity in distribution throughout the nation, according to J. W. Wiseman, chief of the Civilian Production Administration's Inorganic Branch, who spoke to agricultural leaders, farmers, and representatives of the fertilizer industry in Raleigh recently at a conference called to consider fertilizer grades to be recommended for adoption at the next meeting of the State Board of Agriculture.

Declaring that the world supply of nitrogen is approximately 1 million tons less than the need, Wiseman emphasized that the War Department is now laying plans to send larger quantities of nitrogen to countries under U. S. occupation forces.

Wiseman attributed the relative shortage of superphosphate to the inavailability of phosphate rock and sulphuric acid, adding that "Midwest newcomers" in the use of potash will absorb large quantities of increased production of this fertilizer material.

POWER PLANT IMPROVEMENTS

TOWN OF FARMVILLE, N. C.

Sealed proposals will be received by the Mayor and Board of Commissioners of the Town of Farmville, N. C., until 2:00 P. M., August 15, 1946, at the Town Hall in Farmville, for Power Plant improvements enumerated as follows:

SECTION I. Furnishing, delivering and installing a 4 cycle Diesel Engine-driven generating unit having a capacity of approximately 820 K. W. at 30% P. F. and a speed not exceeding 300 R.P.M., including all auxiliary equipment.

SECTION II. Furnishing and delivering switchboard and switchgear equipment.

Each proposal must be accompanied by a certified check, drawn on some bank or trust company authorized to do business in North Carolina, payable to the Mayor and Board of Commissioners of the Town of Farmville, N. C., in an amount equal to five (5) per cent of the amount of the bid, as a guarantee that the contract will be entered into within ten (10) days after and if awarded to the bidder and that the required bond will be executed.

A performance bond will be required of the successful bidder in an amount equal to one hundred (100) per cent of the contract price, conditioned upon the faithful performance of the contract and upon the payment in full to all persons supplying labor and furnishing materials, equipment and/or apparatus for and in connection with the construction of the project.

General contractors are notified that "An Act to Regulate the Practice of General Contracting," ratified by the General Assembly of North Carolina on March 10, 1925,

and as subsequently amended, will be observed in receiving and awarding general contracts.

The Mayor and Board of Commissioners reserve the right to reject any or all bids and to waive informalities. The right is also reserved to hold any or all proposals for a period of not exceeding sixty (60) days from the date of opening thereof.

Plans, specifications and contract documents are open to public inspection at the office of the Town Clerk in Farmville, N. C., and copies may be obtained upon application to the Engineer accompanied by a certified check deposit in the amount of twenty (20) dollars, made payable to the Town of Farmville, N. C. This deposit will be refunded only to those making bona fide direct bids to the Town and further conditioned upon the return of the plans and/or specifications, in acceptable condition, to the Engineer on or before the date set for receiving bids. To those acquiring plans and/or specifications and who find, upon examining same, that they will not or cannot offer a bid to the Town, fifty (50) per cent of the deposit will be refunded, provided the plans and/or specifications are returned to the Engineer, in acceptable condition, on or before the date set for receiving bids.
