BIRD CLUB

Chandler Cox gave an interesting paper on the wild turkey at the Bird Club meeting, Saturday morning. This bird, which is distinctly an American fowl, has a head and neck which are naked of feathers. There are a few stiff bristles on the neck and it is wrinkled and wrinkled. The male has a beard of coarse black bristles hanging from the center of the upper part of the breast.

The tail, which is broad and round, has from 14 to 18 feathers. In this country today these birds chiefly inhabit the dense woods and the borders of swamp lands. The gobblers are polygamists and often have two or three hens under their observation.

The hens steal out and make their nests near grass or bushes or in an abandoned brush field. They hide their nests with great care, not only to prevent detection by predatory animals, but to prevent damage by the gales.

The eggs numbering 8 to 12 are buff-colored white, even tinted over the entire surface with reddish brown.
