There are a few stiff bristles on the neck and it is wrinkled and waddled. The male has a beard of coarse black bristles hanging from the center of the upper part of the breast. The tail, which is broad and round, has from 14 to 18 feathers. In this country today these birds chiefly in-habit the dense woods and the borders of swapp lands. The gobblers are polygamints and often have two or dimentions the subord feathers.
