**Unprecedented Offer
To Certain Specialists**

Civilians, who possess certain
skills used by the United States Army
Air Forces, may be enlisted in non-
commissioned officer grades, regard-
less of whether or not they have had
previous Military Service, according
to a statement issued recently by
M/Sgt. Virgil B. Lindsey, command-
ing Officer of the Greenville (Sub)
Station of the Army Recruiting Ser-
vice located at the New City Hall
building.

Sergeant Lindsey said that a new
directive has reached his sub-station
to the effect that individuals without
prior Military or Naval Service, or
those with prior Military or Naval
Service but discharged prior to May
12, 1946, and who possess job spe-
cialties needed by the Army Air Forces,
may be enlisted in grades based upon
their skill and experience in their
civilian jobs. Men in this category
must meet requirements for enlist-
ment in the Army, and must enlist
for a period of three years.

The Sergeant urges all men, who
are specialists in jobs comparing to
those of the Air Forces, to contact
the local Army Recruiting Sub-Station
at once for full information on this
unprecedented offer.

BIRD CLUB NOTES

"Behold the Birds of the Air" writ-
ten by Rev. James Sprunt for the
January 8 issue of the "Christian
Observer" was the article read by

The writer of the article mentions

from Uncle Natchel's
Book of Experience
