

Greenville Woman Awarded Trip To Chicago Convention

Mrs. Thelma Hardee in Pitt Delegation Attending Farm Bureau's Annual Meeting

Farm Bureau delegates from 51 North Carolina counties are in Chicago this week attending the annual convention of the American Farm Bureau Federation.

More than 15,000 rural people from 45 states and Puerto Rico were expected to take part in the convention. The Farm Bureau with more than 1,250,000 farm family members is the largest general farm organization in the world.

Speakers listed included: Warren R. Austin, U. S. Representative to the United Nations; David E. Lilienthal, chairman of the Atomic Energy Committee; Charles F. Kettering, former research director of General Motors Corporation; James Turner of London, president of the new International Federation of Agricultural Producers; and J. B. Hutson, president of Tobacco Associates, Inc. Senator Edward J. Thye of Minnesota and Congressman Harold D. Coolidge of North Carolina discussed farmer relationships with their respective houses of Congress. The convention opened Monday and continued through yesterday.

TO STUDY MARKETING OF EARLY IRISH POTATOES

Because of various special problems that are involved in the marketing of early Irish potatoes from the Southeastern States, a study of these problems and ways to correct them will be undertaken under the Research and Marketing Act as a cooperative project between the U. S. Department of Agriculture and the Agricultural Experiment Stations of Alabama, Florida, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Virginia. The work will be supervised by H. M. Love of the Virginia Agricultural Experiment Station at Blacksburg, O. C. Stine of the Bureau of Agricultural Economics, and D. F. Fisher of the Bureau of Plant Industry, Soils and Agricultural Engineering.

In some areas of the South Irish potatoes are a highly important crop and many farmers depend on them for the greater part of their income. Production and marketing costs are relatively high and because the crop is normally marketed when immature, it is susceptible to rapid spoilage which results not only in waste of an important food product but in losses to growers and increased costs to consumers.

Plans are to sample the condition of potatoes as they are dug and loaded into trucks at the field, at the grading and shipping points, and again at the wholesale market. So far as practical, some of the potatoes will be followed through the wholesale market to retail stores and consumers in order to get a complete

picture as to where and how much deterioration and spoilage occur from grower to consumer and to obtain consumer reaction to early Southern potatoes in comparison with potatoes from other areas. An important phase of the study will be to keep records on prices and charges for handling and transportation of the product through distribution channels. With these data as a basis, it

is hoped that ways and means can be worked out to get a larger quantity and a better quality of Southern potatoes on the market which should mean increased returns to growers.
