An address by the state regent, Miss Gertrude Carraway of New Bern, and the presence of other state officers and chairmen were highlights of the eighth district meeting of the Daughters of the American Revolution held in the Hookerton Christian church Friday.

Col. Alexander McAllister chapter of Snow Hill was hostess and at the dinner hour served a three course turkey luncheon, followed by green and white ice cream and green cakes iced in white, at the Community house.

Walstonburg PTA Seeks To Better School's Rating

The regular monthly meeting of the Walstonburg Parent-Teacher association was called to order by the president, D. D. Fields, on Thursday, October 7, at 7:30 in the school auditorium. Miss Page Davis of the faculty conducted an inspiring devotion.

"Our Teaching Plans" were discussed by J. R. Peeler, principal, and an outline of six of the departments was presented in order to emphasize the importance of a more functional curriculum. The head of each of these departments gave a very informative summary of his department.

Troy Godwin, athletic director and coach, stressed the value of sports and sportsmanship in school studies. He also outlined the ninth grade health and physical education program.

Miss Mary Ellen Jones, public school music teacher, emphasized the importance of music and songs to a well-rounded school program.

Mrs. Carlos Walston, glee club director and piano teacher, explained how music appreciation makes routine more interesting.

Miss Catherine Campbell, home economics teacher, pointed out the necessity of an adequate knowledge of foods, clothes and home training to a more wholesome life.

David Starling, agriculture teacher, gave a detailed discussion on the new advantages to boys.

In the absence of Mrs. Peeler, commercial teacher, Mr. Peeler spoke about the general aims of the department and its possibilities in helping students obtain good positions after graduation.

It was decided to begin the PTA membership drive immediately. Mr. Fields stressed the importance of this drive, urging a 100% membership of the patrons. Each grade in school is to aid in reaching this goal by obtaining memberships from the parents. Those grades getting 100% membership will receive a prize of \$1.00.

The association adopted as a project for the 1948-49 term the securing of the "Class I" rating for Walstonburg high school, which had been outlined by Mr. Peeler at the September meeting.

Firemen Given Facts On Durham Disaster

Speaking Tuesday night in Ayden at a meeting of the Eastern Carolina Firemen's association, Assistant Chief Lawson of the Durham fire department presented a graphic picture of the disastrous fire which only a week ago destroyed a warehouse of the Colonial Stores and resulted in damages estimated at between \$1,250,000 and \$1,500,000.

Chief Lawson pointed out how the supposedly fireproof structure of steel and cement was filled with inflammable egg crates and goods, and became a roaring oven.

The Ayden fire department was host at a barbecue supper served in the high school gymnasium. Ayden's Chief Jones introduced the board of aldermen, mayor and police department to the 175 present.

Patrolman Holt, who is stationed in Ayden, called on one of the aldermen, Dixie Cannon, to make the address of welcome, to which Chief Soraby of Rocky Mount responded.

President Curtis Flanagan spoke briefly on fire prevention stressing the fact that firemen must be on the lookout for accumulations of debris which may create fires and are hazards.

State Regent Launches Fall Program D. A. R.

Mrs. S. T. White Hostess To Major May Chapter At Its Initial Meeting

Miss Gertrude Carraway, of New Bern, State Regent of the D. A. R., was honor guest and speaker at the initial fall meeting of the Major Benjamin May Chapter, held Saturday with Mrs. S. T. White, of Greenville, as the gracious hostess.

The State Regent launched the fall and winter study of "The D. A. R., Its Past, Present and Future," with an address that was comprehensive and timely. With the simple statement that "women can satisfy their every ambition and yearning for service to home, country and the world, in the multiple and varied fields of the D. A. R.," Miss Carraway proved this fact by outlining the objectives and accomplishments of the respective committees of the National Society, including:

Americanism; Approved Schools, American Music; American Indians; Children A. R., conservation (of resources and humanity); Flag; Good Citizenship Pilgrimage; Magazine; Manual for Citizenship; Museum; Student Loan; Ellis Island; Girl Home Makers; Jr. American Citizens; Motion Picture; National Defense; Radio; U. S. Savings Bonds; Building Promotion.

The State Regent referred to the present as "a crucial period in the history of the world" and pointed out the opportunities afforded women in the active program of the D. A. R. to render a real service in worldwide reconstruction efforts and to help bring about a lasting security and peace.

In closing, the speaker used the initials of the Society as an acronym—Daughters of the Past; America of the Future and Relatives of the Present to emphasize the points of restoration, preservation of the ideals of democracy and the bond of love of home and country that binds its members into a sisterhood dedicated to serving humanity.

The State Regent was presented by Mrs. G. Alex Rouse of the program committee, of which Mrs. Herbert E. Hart is chairman, and Mrs. Rouse also outlined the proposed study for the year, which was accepted by the local chapter.

Bringing the program to a delightful close were vocal selections by Mrs. Herbert Waldrop with Mrs. G. B. W. Hadley as accompanist.

The devotional period was conducted by Mrs. E. B. Beasley, of Fountain, who read a selection from the book of Esther and took as her theme Mordecai's query directed to the ed in obtaining a decree from her husband, the king, to put the Jews to death, "and who knoweth whether thou art come to the kingdom for such a time as this?" Mrs. Beasley applied this to the present opportunities afforded women for service to the nation and she challenged her hearers to exhibit a like courage and willingness to be used.

The Farmville high school Red Devils won their second straight victory of the season last Friday by defeating Wendell, 26-12.

Farmville scored first on a 30-yard jaunt on a reverse by Bobby Brock. A pass from Claude Tyson to Carl King added the extra point.

Ernest Morgan scored the second Farmville touchdown by plunging over center for three yards, climaxing a Farmville sustained drive of 55 yards. Tyson again passed to King for the extra point.

Wendell scored next following a march of 30 yards after a penalty against Farmville had given Wendell the ball on the Farmville 30-yard line.

Farmville scored again on the kickoff following the Wendell touchdown. Brock ran down the sideline for 60 yards and the touchdown.

The fourth touchdown by Farmville was set up after a 45-yard run by Clarence Joyner put the ball on the Wendell four-yard line. Joyner carried the ball over on the second play from this point.

Farmville second stringers then took over, and Wendell scored in two plays following the kick-off.

The Farmville line opened up gaping holes in the Wendell defense, allowing the Farmville backs to roll up considerable yardage. These linemen included Albert Cannon, Jay Flanagan, Johnny Barrett, Roy Flora, Bobby Fulford, Joe Smith, George Wooten, Wilbur Morris and Henry Tyson.
