Farmville scored first on a 30-yard jaunt on a reverse by Bobby Brock.
A pass from Claude Tyson to Carl King added the extra point.

Ernest Morgan scored the second Farmville touchdown by plunging over center for three yards, climaxing a Farmville sustained drive of 55 yards. Tyson again passed to King for the extra point.

Farmville scored again on the kickoff following the Wendell touchdown. Brock ran down the sideline for 60 yards and the touchdown.
