

The school bond issue is expected to be approved by an overwhelming majority. Little opposition has been expressed against this phase, and chools are in dire need of

Governor Scott has taken the cam-paign for roads into every section of the state and advocates for the road bonds have conducted a well-managed campaign that is expected to bring them victory.




