## Farmville Tobacco Market Sets New Record For This Sales Season

Farmville's tobacco market, which] has been steadily climbing ever since the sales were started, reached dizzy heights Monday when 674,858 pounds of the golden leaf sold for \$883,638.02, an average of \$56.85.

Sales through Wednesday totaled 17½ millions pounds and averaged \$47.50 per hundred, according to Fred C. Moore, sales supervisor.

Supervisor Moore also stated that Farmville's seven big warehouses have plenty of space and that there will be few crowded sales from now

Farmers are invited to sell their tobacco on local floors, where competent warehouseman and plenty of buyers guarantee a square deal for those who patronize the market.
