

## Farmville Tobacco Market Sets New Record For This Sales Season

Farmville's tobacco market, which has been steadily climbing ever since the sales were started, reached dizzy heights Monday when 674,555 pounds of the golden leaf sold for \$989,938.02, an average of \$56.35.

Sales through Wednesday totaled 17 1/2 millions pounds and averaged \$47.50 per hundred, according to Fred C. Moore, sales supervisor.

Supervisor Moore also stated that Farmville's seven big warehouses have plenty of space and that there will be few crowded sales from now until the end of the season.

Farmers are invited to sell their tobacco on local floors, where competent warehousemen and plenty of buyers guarantee a square deal for those who patronize the market.

### 60% OF PITT'S PEOPLE WERE X-RAYED FOR TB IN JUNE

Miss Tabitha DeViscanti attended a meeting of the Pitt County Tuberculosis association Monday night in Greenville. Among the information contained in the report of Dr. Thomas Basnett, health officer, on the x-ray survey made in June was that 26,616 people, or approximately 60 per cent of the county's population, were x-rayed and that about 900 were notified to return for another x-ray. More than 800 have returned for the second x-ray. Farmville has a large number of cases of active tuberculosis.

Four hundred beds are being added to the Eastern Carolina Sanatorium at Wilson. Before the x-ray there were approximately 50 Pitt countians waiting for admittance to a sanatorium.

## DR. ROBERT G. LEE

The first year-round Baptist Hour will go on the air over a conventional network of 132 stations on Oct. 2 with Dr. Robert G. Lee of Memphis, Tenn., president of the Southern Baptist Convention, as the speaker. Dr. Lee's theme will be "The Way from Want to Wealth" and his first subject, "Sin and the Sinner's Saviour."

Dr. Lee, who is pastor of the Bellevue Baptist Church in Memphis, will be the speaker during October, November and December. S. F. Lowe, director of the Radio Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention in Atlanta, announced.

The Baptist Hour will be broadcast every Sunday from 3:30 to 4 p. m., EST, and will be financed wholly through voluntary contributions. Stations carrying the program which may be heard by Farmville people are: Kingston, WFTC; Rocky Mount, WEED; Raleigh, WNAO; and Washington, WRRF.

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## School Adopts New Plan To Sell Season Tickets

The Farmville high school athletic association will try an innovation this year in the sale of season tickets.

Heretofore, season tickets have been sold for the football games only, but this year it has been decided to sell one season ticket for the entire school year which will include football, basketball and baseball. The ticket will entitle the holder to attend 24 athletic events during the year. There will be six football games here, 12 basketball games and six baseball games. All of the contests will be played at night. Tickets must be presented at each game and are not transferable. For this 24-game program, season tickets will be offered to adults for \$5.00 each and to school children for \$3.00 each.

Principal Sam D. Bundy stated he feels this is a real bargain and the offer is made to make the season tickets attractive without being prohibitive in price. The price per game for football will be 35c for school children and 75c for adults; basketball admission will be 35c for school children and 50c for adults.

An attractive schedule in football has been arranged which will bring Tarboro, Robertsonville, Ayden, Williamston, South Edgecombe and Scotland Neck to play on the local gridiron. The basketball and baseball schedules of the local high school will be equally attractive.

Principal Sam D. Bundy of the high school stated that the goal is to interest as many people as possible in the athletic program and at the same time have sufficient funds to pay the costs of operating the program. A minimum of \$1,000.00 has been set for season ticket sale and this amount will guarantee that the athletic program can continue on the high scale desired. This amount plus the gate receipts from visitors will pay game guarantees, referees, and will replace equipment as required.

The Farmville high school athletic association under the direction of Jack Turnage, president, and Nell Harris, head cheerleader, will direct the sale in the school, while the Kiwanis club, Rotary club and Junior Chamber of Commerce have appointed committees to plan and push the sale in the town to the adults. Truly, this is a chance to receive a bargain and it is felt that the high school is offering something to the public rather than asking something from the public. The first game here will be played Friday night, Oct. 7, with Tarboro, at 8 o'clock, and the local band will be on hand to enliven the occasion and put on a special parade between halves. Buying season tickets will help the boys and girls and will be a good investment for you.

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
