Finals in the second annual Gold Medal Basketball tournament, sponsored by the Farmville Junior Chamber of Commerce, will be played tomorrow (Saturday) night in the local gymnasium. The girls' title contest starts at 7:30, with the boys' game getting underway soon after the end of the girls' game.

The elimination process started Wednesday night and semi-finals were played last night, too late for inclusion in this week's paper. The tournament is suspending play tonight (Friday) so the participating teams can carry out their regular schedules.


