Annual Typhoid Vaccination Clinics To Begin Monday

Those who have been vaccinated for typhoid within the past three years may take only one dose, a "booster" shot.

FARMVILLE SENDS BIG DELEGATION TO YDC RALLY IN GREENVILLE

At The Kiwanis Club

More than 300 Kiwanians representing clubs from 11 North Carolina towns met in Greenville Monday night and heard Dr. Ora E. Crow, governor of the Carolina Kiwanis district, declare, "There is nothing more harmful in the world than a citizen with good intentions and no sense."

Dr. Crow of Columbia, S. C., addressed the Kiwanians at the meeting of the seventh division of the district held in the dining hall on the ECTC campus.

B. J. Holleman of Jacksonville, division lieutenant governor, presided at the meeting.

Ed E. Rawl, past lieutenant governor, welcomed the Kiwanians to Greenville, and Dr. John D. Messick, president of ECTC, welcomed the Kiwanians to the college. Dr. Messick pointed out that the college at the present time has 1,858 students—250 more than ever before enrolled in the school.

Present at the meeting were members of Kiwanis clubs of Farmville, Goldsboro, Jacksonville, Kinston, Wilmington, Stantonsburg, Washington, Wilson, Greenville, Ahoskie and Willsboro.

The college singers under the direction of Dr. Dan E. Vornholt rendered the musical selections "Jim Along Jose," "I'll See You Again," and an arrangement of "Chop-Sticks." Bob Mayo, outstanding baritone and president of college Circle K club, sang a solo "Water Boy" at the request of the Kiwanians.

David Moore, secretary of Greenville club, introduced Herb Hennis of Darlington, S. C., an active Kiwanis official since 1920, and presented Hennis with a birthday gift from the seventh division. Hennis reported on the progress and activities of the district during the past year, and told the members of the seventh division that the club secretaries in this area are doing the most efficient job in the district.

Sam D. Bundy of Farmville, past lieutenant governor of the division, introduced Dr. Crow, dean of the University of South Carolina, who was the principal speaker at the meeting.

Dr. Crow, in his address, reviewed the Kiwanis activities which are being carried on in the district including the underprivileged children project, the Christmas toys project and religious, legislative and civic activities of the clubs.

Dr. Crow declared there has been a decline in the importance of the individual in America, and that the number of people who are in business for themselves has been drastically reduced.

"We have decreased the freedom of the individuals in America in the past 50 years, and particularly in the last 20 years," he asserted. "It is a country of big business and big government." He said the trend in the lessening of the importance of the individual in the United States means "we must cooperate or die."

He lashed out at what he called "legislation in the courts," and termed the practice in the courts of the country today "one of the most dangerous things we have." Dr. Crow told his listeners that the individuals of the country today are the ones who must preserve the American way of life as it was once known.

"You and I have a great duty to perform in holding our courts true," he stated. "You and I have been somewhat forgetful in pushing an aggressive citizenship. Every nation must from time to time renew its strength from its past. There will always be an America, when Kiwanians remember their principles and follow them."

Before the meeting at the college the visiting Kiwanians were entertained at a social hour at the Hotel Proctor arranged by President, Tige Gardner and Secretary Dave Moore of the Greenville club.

Baseball Team Wins 3 Straight On Home Field

The Farmville high school baseball team opened its home stand last Thursday night by defeating Belvoir, 14-5, the first of three games the locals won during the week on their home field.

Harvey Lee Webb went the route for the locals, allowing only five hits, while striking out five men without issuing a single base on balls.

The game was close until the third inning when a six-run Farmville rally put the game on ice. The Red Devils collected only eight hits but made all of them count. Belvoir collected seven hits. Bobby Brock, with three hits, led the Farmville offense. Carl King rapped out a triple.

On Friday night the South Edgecombe squad was the victim of Coach Elbert Moore's greatly improved arm. This time the score was 9-6. Randolph Allen left his third base post for the night and pitched the victory. South Edgecombe used four hurlers in an effort to stop the Red Devils. The locals again showed an ability to make their hits count for runs, as they were able to get only seven safe hits during the game.

Brock again paced the batters, getting three hits in four attempts.

Vanceboro was the third team to fall before the locals, as Webb pitched a 7-4 victory Monday night. Vanceboro garnered only four runs from nine hits, while Farmville was scoring seven runs on eight hits. Eleven stolen bases by the Farmville club greatly aided the cause.

Richard Oakley led Farmville's hitters, connecting for a double and two singles on three official trips to the plate.
