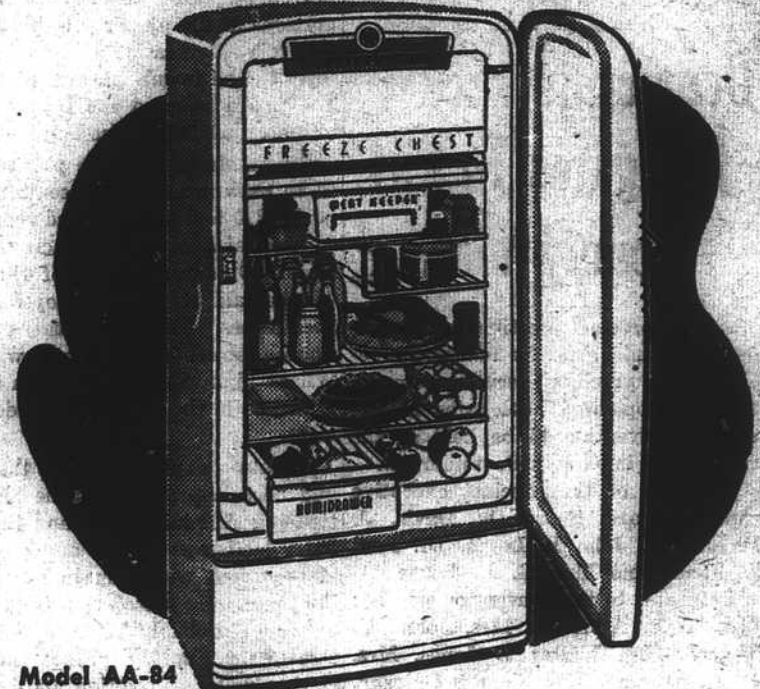
HOME DEMONSTRATION COUNCIL MEETS TUESDAY

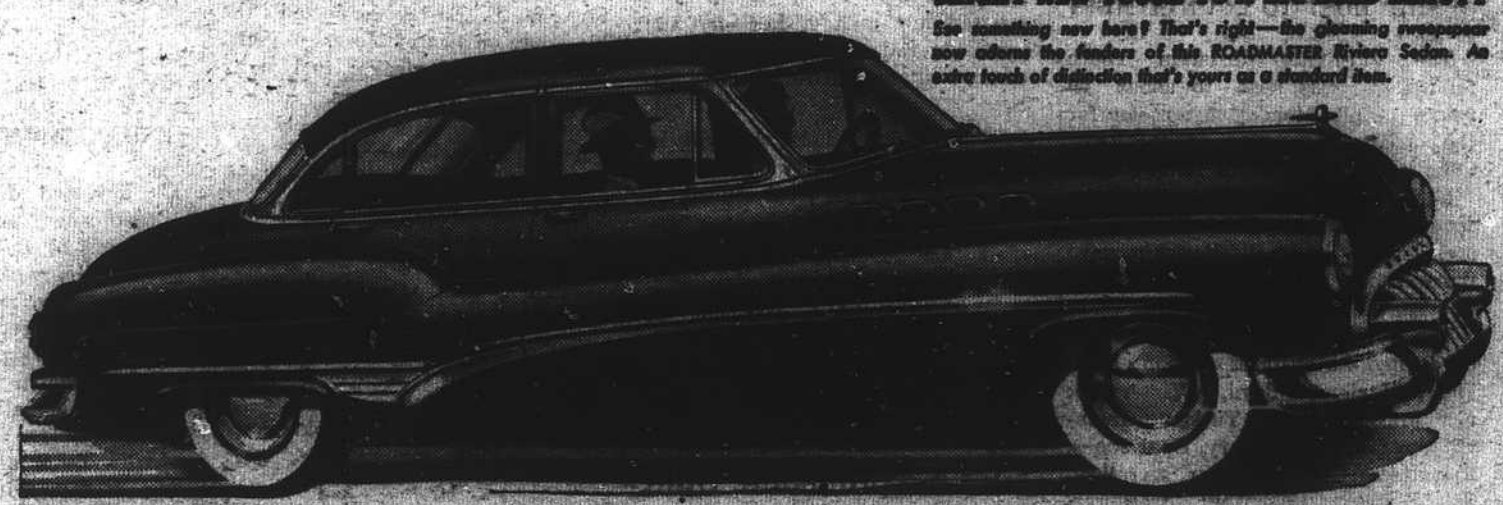
