place in every precinct tomorrow from 9 a. m. until the books are closed at sunset. Those eligible to vote but who have not taken trouble to get their names on the books are advised and warned to do so, or else their only activity in the May 27 primary will be as a spectator.

Persons wishing to qualify must be at least 21 years of age, or will become 21 before the date of the general election, November 7, 1950, and must also be able to read and write Miami. Fla. any section of the State Constitution in the English language to the satisfaction unless they are perman-ently registered under the "Grandfather Clause."

It is also required that the voter to-be must have been a resident of the State for at least one year, or will have been by the date of the November election, and a resident of the precinct in which he wishes to vote for at least four months preceding the election.

General rules concerning the qualifications of voters state that a person is not eligible to vote if he has moved from one county to another within four months of the election However, if he has moved from one precinct to another, but in the same county within the period prescribed he is allowed to vote but must do so in the precinct from which he moved.
